And GO!
In that culture, eating together indicated relationship. You knew exactly how much you were valued based on if you were invited to a mealand then, where you were seated. And if you refused an invitation, that also told the whole village how much you valued the one who invited you.
Do you think the man in verse 15 knows what he is talking about when he brings up feasting in the kingdom of God? Who would you guess the Jews assumed would naturally be there?
Jesus uses another parable to explain what they aren't yet grasping. He's still trying to get them to see that they could miss outare missing outon the kingdom of God. They are sitting there, feasting with him, and they don't get it. Look back at 4:18-21. What are Jesus' words in 4:21? So, the kingdom of God is there; everyone humbly following Jesus is a part of it. Does the man in 14:15 realize this?
If sitting at a meal together indicated relationship, what does it mean when the guests
make excuses?
What does the last guest not even say that the other two did?
What could this mean?
Do their excuses seem legit to you?
Why does Jesus call this master/owner of the house just "a certain man" at the beginning of the parable?
It seems that the story would be done after the servant says, "what you ordered has been done." Why does Jesus add the part about there still being room?

What...hate my family?! That doesn't sound like something God would want, Jesus.

So, this is a puzzle. The Biblical authors put these in to make us stop and ask Jesus to explain it to us.

There's also something important in their culture that we miss: In the world of the Old Testament and the Jews of Jesus' day:

To love = to be loyal to the one you were in covenant with

For instance, this is what is meant by:

"Love the Lord your God with ALL your heart, soul, mind and strength."

To hate = to be loyal to someone else, in this case to Jesus

Jesus is speaking to them about their absolute loyalty. We cannot be his disciple if we are ultimately loyal to ANYONE else...even ourselves. It makes sense. If we are loyal to Jesus...if he is always the one we desire to please above all else and to be closest to, then his love fills our hearts and we can be truly loving to our family. His love is selfless. If we aren't letting him be our one and only Sovereign, our love will not be the selfless, life-giving love God designed us to have for one another.
